Teaching Ideas

Place-Based Curriculum Design

Teachers explore the "where are we" and "who lives here" questions through researching news articles related to their community of students. Teachers create an investigation that connects with and develops the lens of the local communities where students live and learn.

Ecological Mindedness

Teachers identify a concept, skill, or idea that students can explore through the lens of interconnectedness, care, and integrity. Teachers will create a lesson plan for students to explore the concept, emphasizing how the concept shapes their beliefs and how they might act on them with integrity.
